On February 9th houseless/No-income, indigenous, Black, Brown, Disabled visionary poets and cultural workers from the Bay Area begin the long journey to retrace their Herstoric Stolen land /Hoarded Resources UnTours to release the powerful *UnTour Book Across Occupied Turtle Island*.

The UnTour Book chronicles their walks into occupied land and stolen resources in the US. Sites like occupied Lenape Territory aka Philadelphias' main Line and the historic

“Old Philadelphia” rife with examples of what tiny gray-garcia calls Klanmarks and ManUmeants, honoring the multitude of self-proclaimed “discoverers” such as Cristopher Columbus who in actuality perpetrated great harm on indigenous peoples both personally and historically or Clayton Duncan and other indigenous Pomo leaders work to unwash the lies about the Bloody Island Massacre in so-called KelseyVille named after the murderer who perpetrated the genocide of hundreds of innocent indigenous women and children, or Priscilla Hunter, the Pomo Mama Tree Warrior and Protector of so many old growth trees from the violence of the Lumber Industry to the Resistance Marks of Alex Nieto, Mario Woods and Sean Monterrosa to name a few, killed by PoLice but honored in San Francisco in beautiful street-based murals of resistance to the warrior work of indigenous women creating their own Land Trust, and the story of indigenous women taking down the ManUmeant honoring a Spanish missionary who committed genocide on California Indians, to sites of BlackLand Return and resistance, all of this and so much more, reaching globally into Palestine, West Papua, Hawai’i and Kashmir.

“KlanMarks” are my word for all the colonizer blight claiming sacred spaces and sacred stories and washing the truth of genocide off the stolen land— thousands of mis-named, occupied and stolen indigenous lands and sacred sites across Turtle Island, where the land-stealers, occupiers, genocidal perpetrators, aka colonizers are lifted up as heroes. The names of the murderers, the rapists, the robbers, the stealers, the re-writers, and the occupiers litter Turtle Island. But, in this book, there are also so many powerful acts of re-creating, redefining, LandBacking, and land-returning stolen Mama Earth—from Palestine to Chief Siah’l (Seattle) on Turtle Island, from Bloody Island to Lisjan

Land—so this UnTourBook is also meant to honor, pray, dream, and lift up the voices of resistance until all of the KlanMarks are gone and all the LiberationMarks replace them.

In this opening session, we take up the historical conjuncture at hand and situate ourselves through the conceptual and political framework of the “third reconstruction.” We argue that, in the U.S., each reconstruction has entailed struggles to challenge racial regimes of property, to socialize land, and to assert housing as a social right. How then do we understand, and contribute to, the third reconstruction, which we envision as an uprising against the propertied-policed order of racial capitalism?

In this session, we historicize the settler colonial and imperial underpinnings of urban water infrastructure and management in Los Angeles by closely examining the Los Angeles Aqueduct and the Los Angeles River Master Plan (LARMP). Reflecting on Paiute and Tongva's teachings from the documentary, we ask: How can restoring our relationality and responsibility to local water shift our thinking about land and housing justice?

Organizing the Abolition University: Towards an Algorithmic Ecology of People's Knowledge

Location: UCLA Luskin School of Public Affairs, Room 2355 (337 Charles E. Young Drive East, Los Angeles, CA 90095)

The current moment has blown away the longstanding myth of the university as simply a site of classroom instruction and pure research. The campus, in both its conceptual and materialist forms, is not only a locus of power but also a critical site of struggle. The only solution is abolition. For us this does not mean an end to higher education but freeing the university from its current formation. In this session we will: 1) Open with a broad discussion about what we mean precisely by freedom and a freedom school; 2) Offer a materialist overview of the university and its campus form, highlighting the converging vectors of social, economic, ecological, and intellectual power that are routed through higher education within its current racial capitalist form; 3) Briefly survey the histories of abolition university strategies rooted in the Black study and struggle tradition; 4) Drill down to a specific locus of power, specifically the omnipresence of policing, not just our bodies and behavior but our thinking and dreaming; 5) Deploy the "algorithmic ecology" framework to collectively workshop the building blocks for an abolitionist university that we can all carry back to our local homesites.

Alongside the readings, please come having answered the questions in the following “social footprint mapping” rubric informed by the specific conditions of your campus. We will use your answers to build the broader vision of an abolition university.

In this session, Union de Vecinos, the Eastside Local of the Los Angeles Tenants Union, will lead a hands-on history of urban land struggle in Los Angeles. Through visits to key neighborhood sites with tenants in struggle across Boyle Heights and Downtown Los Angeles, coupled with a panel and discussion, UV will demonstrate its practice of building poor people's democratic power by organizing territory on a neighborhood level. While operating at this block-by-block scale, UV will also connect this local organizing to its long history of international solidarity with Third World land struggles across the globe.

Free the Land: Fighting Investment Goliaths to Establish the Commons

In this session, we will travel to the Crenshaw neighborhood in South Central Los Angeles to explore the journey of the Crenshaw Subway Coalition, a radical Black organization dedicated to combating gentrification, and its evolution into Downtown Crenshaw Rising (DCR) and the Liberty Ecosystem. We will learn from Liberty Ecosystem architect and DCR CEO Damien Goodmon, along with other DCR community leaders, about their solidarity economy initiatives and strategy. These efforts serve as a response to the area's hyper-commodification of real estate and a formidable adversary: public pension funds, North America's largest public investment vehicles.

2. Any evidence of payment (checks, warrants, ACH transactions, etc.) to any of these individuals for services rendered, salaries, benefits, expense reimbursements or other financial remuneration for their services rendered.

The timeframe for this request is from January 1, 2022 to the present date.

Pursuant to Government Code section 7928.400, all employment contracts for public employees are public records subject to disclosure.

As you also know, the California Supreme Court, in *International Federation of Professional and Technical Engineers, Local 21, AFL-CIO, et al v. Superior Court* (2007) 42 Cal. 4th 319, ruled that a newspapers' request for salary and benefit information of police officers was subject to disclosure via a California Public Records Act request similar to this one. The Court found that "...the public has a strong, well-established interest in the amount of salary paid to public employees." *International Federation*, supra at page 339. The Court rebuffed the union's argument that a public employee's "personal" salary and benefits were private and not open to disclosure to the public. The

Court stated: "...A public employee's salary relates to a particular person, but, as discussed above, it is a matter of public interest and not primarily a matter of the individual's private business." *International Federation*, supra at page 341. In sum, the Court affirmed the Appeals Court's order that the City of Oakland turn over this information to the requesting newspaper.

Other courts have come to the same conclusion regarding non-police employees: *San Diego County Employees Retirement Association v. Superior Court* (2011) 196 Cal. App. 4th 1228, *Sonoma County Employees' Retirement Association v. Superior Court* (2011) 198 Cal. App. 4th 986 and *Sacramento County Employees' Retirement System v. Superior Court* (2011) 195 Cal. App. 4th 440 (all requiring the disclosure of retired employees' salary and benefits).

Also, contracts for goods or services entered into by an agency (here a school district) and a third party must be disclosed under the Public Records Act. Government Code section 7928.801.

We expect UCLA will NOT redact the names of its staff or third parties (non-students) who may appear in responsive documents as that is not allowed under the PRA statute and case law. *Iloh v. Regents of Univ. of California*, (2023) 87 Cal. App. 5th 513, 527–28, reh'g denied (Feb. 6, 2023), review denied (Apr. 12, 2023) and *Commission on Peace Officer Standards & Training v. Superior Court* (2007) 42 Cal. 4th 278, 288.

These requests are for all writings and communications (including but not limited to, letters, electronic communications, e-mails, text messages, notes, memorandums, messages) whether or not those communications are stored in the agency's files and/or servers or on personal devices / accounts such as private electronic mail accounts or cellular telephones or cellular telephones issued by the agency to any agency personnel. *City of San Jose v. Superior Court (Smith)* (2017) 2 Cal. 5th 608.

We note that "A state or local agency may not allow another party to control the disclosure of information that is otherwise subject to disclosure pursuant to this division." Government Code section 7921.005. *Register Division of Freedom Newspapers v. County of Orange* (1984) 158 Cal. App. 3d 893, 903 (settlement related documents, including settlement agreements, are subject to disclosure under the PRA. Assurances of confidentiality are not sufficient to transform a public record into a private one).

**REQUEST FOR INFORMATION IN ELECTRONIC FORMAT PURSUANT TO
GOVERNMENT CODE SECTION 7922.570 (A) & (B)**

My client is seeking these records in all electronic formats your office keeps them in. Under the Public Records Act, the agency is required to deliver the information in whatever electronic format it is in **no matter whether it is Excel, Word, WordPerfect or some other program or programs.** Government Code section 7922.570 (a) & (b). **My client’s request extends to receipt of this information in the electronic format your office maintains these records in.** Delivery of this information to me by electronic mail (craig@craigalexanderlaw.com) or via a thumb drive or via a disk is fine. I can supply the agency with a thumb drive if needed. *Please advise what electronic format these records are kept in.*

In addition, if there are documents that satisfy this request that are in **both** electronic and paper formats, *my client offers to receive the electronic version of those records and forgo inspection and potential photocopying of those paper copies.* It is hoped that this will save the agency and my client’s time, trouble and expense.

If you anticipate that data compilation, extraction, or programming will be required to satisfy a request (per Section 7922.575 (b) (2)), please provide a written estimate and justification for same.

In addition, on May 28, 2020 the California Supreme Court ruled that an agency may not charge a requestor of responsive documents for the act of searching for those documents or for review and redaction of any portion of a responsive document where the agency is claiming it is subject to an exemption or privilege. *National Lawyers Guild v. City of Hayward, et al* (2020) 9 Cal. 5th 488.

REQUEST FOR INSPECTION OF DOCUMENTS

For any records not delivered electronically, my client elects to inspect these non-electronic records. Once my client’s agent and/or I have had an opportunity to inspect these records, we will designate which documents we will wish to obtain copies from your office and its agents, employees, consultants, etc. I also note that under Government Code section 7922.530 (b) my client’s agent has the right to use their own equipment (usually a cell phone) to take photos of the responsive documents being inspected.

The California Public Records Act requires the District’s office to “reveal the general nature of the documents withheld,” and to “set forth the names and titles or positions of

each person responsible for the denial.” Cal. Govt. Code Section 7922.540. I emphasize my client’s request for a specific response and all applicable exemptions to the request. A blanket list of exemptions that may or may not apply to the request coupled with a failure to indicate the existence of documents responsive to the request denies us the ability to evaluate whether the District has justifiably withheld responsive documents. Denying my client her opportunity frustrates the Legislature’s primary purpose in enacting the California Public Records Act, which is to “maximize public access to agency records.”

There is no question that your office is a public entity subject to the Public Records Act pursuant to Government Code section 7920.525 and it must comply with the Request as set forth under the Act.

Terms utilized that are defined by the California Public Records Act should be given their full meaning. Thus, for example, a request for any “writing” includes a request for “any handwriting, typewriting, printing, Photostatting, photographing, photocopying, transmitting by electronic mail or facsimile, and every other means of recording upon any tangible thing any form of communication or representation, including letters, words, pictures, sounds, or symbols, or combinations thereof, and any record thereby created, regardless of the manner in which the record has been stored. Cal. Govt Code section 7920.545. In keeping with the provisions of the California Public Records Act, “writing” includes any preliminary drafts, notes or interagency or intra-agency memoranda” unless such draft items are “not retained...in the ordinary course of business” and “the public interest in withholding clearly outweighs the public interest in disclosure.”

Additionally, certain common terms should be given broad interpretation. For example, “relating to” means, in addition to the usual and customary meaning, depict or depicting, discuss or discussing, refer to or referring, reflect or reflecting, support or supporting, refute or refuting, address or addressing, evidence or evidencing, or record or recording.

For the purposes of this letter, a reference to an entity or body, such as the District’s office includes all representatives of the entity or body.

Congratulations! We are pleased to invite you to be one of two UCLA Activists-in-Residence who are based at the UCLA Luskin Institute on Inequality and Democracy. Your brilliant work as a "povertyskola," poet, publisher, and longtime organizer, along with your proposed project stood out from an extremely competitive pool of applicants. The UCLA Activist-in-Residence is a joint program between the [UCLA Luskin Institute on Inequality and Democracy](#), [UCLA Asian American Studies Center](#), [cityLAB-UCLA](#), and the [UCLA Center for the Study of Women/Barbra Streisand Center](#) and we would be thrilled to have you as a part of the 2024 cohort.

The UCLA Activist-in-Residence is designed to achieve two goals. The first and foremost is for you to have the time to undertake the project that you laid out in your application and to thereby be able to reflect upon, and deepen, your organizing work. The second is involvement with the intellectual life of the UCLA Luskin Institute on Inequality and Democracy and more broadly, UCLA. Institute activities range from research collectives to public programs to freedom schools and we hope to engage you with some of these in keeping with your interest and availability. ***IMPORTANT NOTE (A):** A limited appointment is viewed as an employee of the university and [UC policy SB 1467](#) strictly prohibits all former UC employees from being set up as a UC vendor for a period of two (2) years from the date of separation. This means that when the activist-in-residence appointment comes to an end, the individual will be ineligible to receive any payments from any UC campus as either a vendor or as an independent contractor for a duration of two (2) years. Types of unallowable payments include honoraria, guest speaker fees, consultant fees, etc.

Maggie, you should have received an email from PaymentWorks this morning – please follow the prompts and do not hesitate to reach out with any questions. It usually takes ~1 week to complete this process if you respond to the emails from PaymentWorks and follow the prompts in a timely fashion – you can see the attached screenshot that there are 4 more steps to approval. Both you and I will receive an email once the process is complete and POOR Magazine is approved/assigned a vendor number.

As I'd mentioned, UCLA is transitioning to a new financial platform this month – we've been told we need things submitted by December 13th to have them properly processed, hence the rush.

Per the instructions in my email below from Dec. 1st, as soon as POOR Magazine is assigned a vendor number through PaymentWorks, we need to submit a number of documents to the UCLA Purchasing Department to get POOR Magazine set up as a vendor. The UCLA Purchasing Department approval process typically takes ~1 month and we cannot submit the required paperwork until the PaymentWorks process is completed. Hence, the rush.

The list of documents we'll need to submit to Purchasing is here:

I'll begin preparing these documents as much as I can, but will need your help. To start off, please send over the following:

- Proof of general liability insurance – if you don't have this, please let me know and I'll begin paperwork for a waiver that you'll need to sign.

In general, things take a while given the very laborious bureaucracy we have to deal with, so the sooner we can push things through, the better. We are not able to issue any payments until both of these processes are complete.

I'm moving the team to BCC, with the exception of Tiny.

In order to set up POOR Magazine as a UCLA vendor, there are a few steps listed below.

Again, I'm happy to hop on a phone call and/or Zoom call to facilitate and/or answer or clarify any questions.

Please note: it is an unusual time at UCLA this month since UCLA at-large will be transitioning to a new financial platform overall, so the sooner we can get this done, the better in hopes of avoiding any new system glitches.

#1) Please provide the exact name of the nonprofit that will be set up. I ask since I want to make sure it's not already listed as a vendor.

#2) If POOR Magazine is not a registered UCLA vendor, then we need to get it enrolled in UCLA's new vendor payment system, [PaymentWorks](#). PaymentWorks allows UCLA vendors to securely enter their business details and payment information directly and securely. In addition, you can maintain and update your business/payment information within the PaymentWorks platform.

To begin this process, **I need the name of the registered name of the non-profit and the email address best suited for the person who will be going through this process and interfacing with the vendor payment system.**

Once I have that email, then an invitation will be sent via email from the PaymentWorks platform to create an account. After the PaymentWorks account is created, you will receive another email from PaymentWorks indicating the account is created. It is then possible to proceed with registering/enrolling in the vendor system which is required in order to be able to receive checks from UCLA.

Continue to follow the email prompts from PaymentWorks and it will confirm once the "Payee Onboarding" process is complete. **We encourage you to complete this process at your earliest convenience and it typically takes approximately 1-2 weeks to complete if things go smoothly.**

Once things are complete in PaymentWorks and for the purposes of UCLA, POOR Magazine will have a "vendor number" for payments.

#3) Finally, we need to set you up as an approved vendor through UCLA Purchasing which allows larger sums of funding to be transferred. This is what takes more time and paperwork. Because of the financial transition this month, I'm waiting to hear back from our school's finance office re: how this affects this process because I don't want any of us to do additional work if it's unwarranted.

Let's proceed with steps 1 & 2 and I'll keep you updated with how we can most efficiently get you set up in Purchasing.

Again, I realize it's a lot – UCLA has a lot of bureaucracy – and I'm happy to hop on a phone call or Zoom for any clarification and/or further conversation.
